In the end, I made it through the prep session but there was still much more to be done.

Moving on to the next stage: Preparation which probably proved to be the most difficult stage for me because there were several things to be done such as raising sponsorship money (which was a whopping \$550 by the way), finding willing advertisers, practicing in my gown and heels, making a casual wear modeling walk, creating a thank you card sample and an art contest entry, and filling in all my pageant weekend paperwork. This caused me to stress because I was a bit late completing some of these tasks, but I pushed past this stage too, with tons of support from my family, my friends and of course, you! (thanks again)

Soon pageant weekend had come and my mother, aunt, cousin and I were frantically rushing around meeting hair appointments, packing bags and filling in last minute papers. It Was. Crazy. Eventually we set off for the hotel and I was feeling pretty good even though I was getting constant complaints such as "Audrey you've ruined it, get a comb" or "Did you pack the magazine, go get it" but I was happy nonetheless. Ok that's not completely true, I was, kind of scared. I didn't want to mess anything up so cautious became my word of the day.

We arrived on a Thursday and I began practicing my footing for the stage as I would be doing casual wear on Friday morning. I didn't get to practice for long because there was an optional party planned for the girls in the grand ball room. I decided to go and see who I could meet. I'm not going to lie it was

awkward but I had a lot of fun. Soon Friday came and I was ready for my casual wear modeling and guess what? I was first in literally everything during pageant weekend because of my last name, which made sense but it stressed me out even more. About 2 minutes after I finished my last walk on the stage I had to run to dance rehearsals because on the last day of pageant weekend we were to do a preteen group dance. This is where I made my second pageant friend and yes, we were the two girls in the back who had no idea what they were doing just laughing and trying their best. After rehearsals friend one and friend two met and we all planned to meet up next to the gym to practice our dance. I can't explain to you how happy I was to have a group of people to call friends that were just as lost as me. After rehearsal, we were free until about 7:00 pm because now we had to start getting ready for formal wear and personal introduction.

I was so worried about walking a circle in my formal wear dress that while I was practicing I walked into a sign. Not my best moment but I can laugh at it now because it all ended up being ok. I gave my personal introduction and I walked my circle in my heels and gown. Once Friday night's performance was over we (friend 1, friend 2, my cousin, and I) all went out for ice-cream to celebrate being over half way done with pageant requirements and from there we headed to the gym to practice our dance again and just to talk. The only thing left was Saturday's finale and the required interview and I felt set and ready.

So, though I didn't win overall, I would stamp my first pageant with success because I learned new things, made new friends, and gained a whole lot more confidence. Pastor Mertins has given us permission to excerpt the parables from his weekly sermons and reprint them in the Colonnade. On Sunday, July 9, 2017, the pastor wove another thought provoking parable into his message entitled, "Prisoners of Hope". Social scientists say we need to hear new information about 7 times for it to be absorbed into our memory bank. If this is so, reading or hearing this parable one more time is probably a good thing. So, here it is, one more time:

There was a man who was walking down the street when all the sudden he fell into a deep hole. The walls were so steep that he couldn't climb out and after struggling for a time he began to cry out for help.

A doctor was passing by along the road and he looked down into the pit when the man yelled up, **"Hey! Can you help me out?"** The doctor thought about it for a moment while stroking the stethoscope around his neck, and then he reached into his pocket, wrote a prescription, dropped it into the hole, and kept walking.

Then a preacher came walking along and the guy shouted up, **"Hey Reverend! I'm stuck down here in this hole; can you help me out?"** The pastor very slowly and deliberately put his hands together, said a prayer for the man, and kept walking.

Next a sweet older woman from the local church came up to the edge of the hole and the man yelled, **"Excuse me! Please help me out of here."** The woman stared right into the man's eyes and said, **"Don't you know that God helps those who help themselves?"** And with that she went on her way.

Finally, a friend walked up and the man shouted, **"It's me, I'm stuck in the hole, can you help me out?"** To which the friend jumped right down into the hole. The man said, **"Are you stupid? Now we're both stuck down here!"** And the friend said, **"Yeah, but I've been down here before and I know the way out."**

Jesus is the king who jumps down into the pit of our existence and offers us hope.

All of us have been lost at one point or another. We have fallen into pits that we simply could not escape on our own. We've been burdened by financial fear, relationship woes, or employment uncertainty. We've felt suffocated by limited direction, unending loneliness, or deep despair. We've been bullied, belittled, or berated. But Jesus found us and guided us out.

Jesus does not leave us abandoned. Jesus jumps down into the miry bog of our lives and says, **"Follow me, I've been here before, and I know the way out."** Amen.

Aluminum Can Ministry

(from a previous article)

Thanks to your outstanding participation, the Cokesbury Aluminum Can Ministry continues! Thanks for faithfully saving and donating your cans. In addition to saving all your aluminum cans, there are a number of other ways that you can help those who process these cans for recycling.

Do not squeeze cans in the middle. The current method being used to crush cans works best if cans are not squeezed in the middle but left intact.

If you do have a can crusher and wish to crush your cans, just be sure that they are crushed flat. This saves the number of bags needed to transport cans and also prevents bags from being cut by the sharp edges of the cans.

Separate aluminum pet food cans from beverage cans. Mixing these cans delays processing because they have to be separated.

Encourage all of your friends and neighbors to save their aluminum cans and deposit them in the church collection bin in front of the Cokesbury UMC Fruit Shed / Ellie Shop.

Please put your cans in the church recycling bin and *not* the County recycling trailer. Cans put in the county trailer are lost to the Aluminum Can Ministry.

If you would like to assist with this ministry by helping to crush and bag cans, call the church office to arrange a can-crushing session. It is good exercise, try it!

Thank you for your continued support for this program! Keep saving those cans!
