Charge Conference Report from the Pastor

The report shown below is my Pastor's Report that I gave during Cokesbury's Charge Conference held on Saturday, October 22, 2005. This written report was made in response to the following question asked by the District Superintendent:

"Pastors shall be asked by the District Superintendent in the Charge Conference to report on their programs of continuing education (form provided), formation and spiritual growth for the past year and plans for the year to come." This report should include anything that the pastor would like to reflect on concerning his/her ministry in the church/charge during the past year.

...my hope is that, as your faith increases, my sphere of action among you may be greatly enlarged, so that we may proclaim the good news in lands beyond you... "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord." — with sincere apologies to the Apostle Paul for adapting 2 Corinthians 10:15-17

This year has been one in which my ministry has greatly enlarged. Every aspect of ministry has been fully embraced. And in doing so, there is no aspect of my life which has not been touched by the love and the compassion that I experience here, and there is no limit to the thanksgiving that I feel for the people of Cokesbury who have welcomed me and my family into their lives.

I have sat with the dying, comforted the bereaved and the broken hearted, prayed with the sick, visited the lonely and the imprisoned, shared in the joy, played with young, labored in love, fed the hungry, and proclaimed a word of hope and forgiveness. I have baptized your young, conducted marriages for your sons and daughters, and sadly, buried those whom you have loved.

Indeed, I have been blessed by God to be appointed to Cokesbury. What a wonderful place to serve the people of God in this community.

From my perspective, 2005 has been a year in which I have developed stronger connections with the people at Cokesbury. My ministry has moved to a deeper level as I do more counseling and pastoral care with individuals. Part of this may be due to the passage of time as I completed my second year of appointment to Cokesbury and started my third year, which allowed members of the congregation to become more comfortable with me and have more of a sense of the kind of person and pastor that I am.

On a personal note, it was very meaningful for me to take a two-week family vacation this year, something that had not happened during any of my previous years in ministry. It allowed me the opportunity to see my grandmother before she died and to spend an extended period of time with our new grandson. I do appreciate the understanding and flexibility shown to me by Cokesbury, especially the Staff Parish Relations Committee who have been so supportive of me.

My spiritual formation and growth comes through the continuing education classes that I take. They afford me the opportunity to be with other pastors and colleagues and share experiences and receive guidance and support from "those who have been there." At the same time, a significant amount of spiritual growth and encouragement comes as I participate in and teach classes at Cokesbury. I get energized as I hear the class participants express their thoughts on the scripture. Their perspectives give me new insight and generate a richer, more textured understanding of the scripture. Indeed, just the number of adults I see participating in our special Bible and seasonal studies is inspiring for me, and encourages me in my ministry.

Finally, quoting once more from the Apostle Paul, I would like to thank you by saying, "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now."

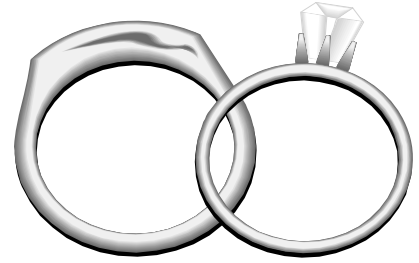

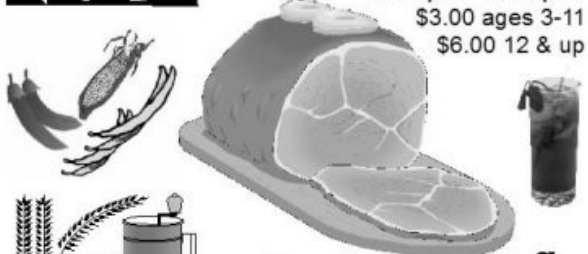

Church Goals for 2006

At the Charge Conference on October 22, 2005, Cokesbury adopted the following goals in response to questions 2, 3, and 4. With your help, these goals can become reality in 2006.

2. How will you make disciples by welcoming new people to Christ through the church? (List goals related to the areas of hospitality and evangelism.)

Cokesbury will provide a welcoming church by:

- a. Providing opportunities for members of the community to participate in fun and exciting church events (such as Kids' Fest, "open-to-the-community" suppers) at no cost to the participant.
- b. Through the Flea Market, providing a place where low income families can sell items to earn money and can purchase inexpensive items such as clothes and household goods.
- c. Conducting an invite-a-friend program with 20 or more member households inviting their neighbors and friends to attend a worship service or other spiritual formation event at the church.

Quantitative Goal: New Members Received into the Congregation: 20

3. How will you make disciples by nurturing person in their faith? (List goals related to education, worship, Christian formation, membership care, small groups, and stewardship.)

Cokesbury UMC will nurture people in their faith through:

- a. Offering short-term Bible studies and seasonal (Advent, Lenten, summertime) studies; each study will be held at multiple times to allow maximum participation.
- b. Offering special worship opportunities (such as Christmas vespers, Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and All Saints Day) with an emphasis on spiritual formation and faith-building experiences.
- c. Providing semi-annual seminars on spiritual formation and growth.

Quantitative Goals: Average Weekly Worship Attendance: 150
Adult/Children Participating in Christian Education: 65

4. How will transformed disciples be Christ to others in the world? List goals related to the local and larger community of compassion, justice and advocacy.)

Cokesbury will be Christ to others through:

- a. Participating in special Sunday activities (such as Children's Sabbath, Organ and Tissue Donor Sunday) to raise awareness and promote individual advocacy for children's issues and for people with special needs.
- b. Providing meals for the homeless shelter on a recurring schedule.
- c. Continuing our covenantal ministry to pray for and encourage Virginia Annual Conference missionaries.
- d. Inviting other churches to participate in the Helping Hands ministry or assist them in establishing a similar program.

Use It Or Lose It

Recently, one of our church organizations found that they had a dormant account that had been turned over to the state of Virginia, due to “non-use”. Doug Phelps asked that we run the following article, to possibly save you from the hassle of trying to reclaim money from forgotten accounts. It is more common than you thing.

According to the Virginia Uniform Disposition of Unclaimed Property Act, accounts which have not had activity (deposits, withdrawals) for a period of five years are considered abandoned property (dividend credits are NOT considered activity). You can easily reactivate your account by depositing or withdrawing at least \$1.00.

Once a year, financial institutions are required by law to turn over the entire balance on all abandoned accounts to the state. If your account is turned over to the state, you may reclaim it by contacting the Virginia State Treasurer's Office at:

State of the Church Report

Rev. Urban is in his third year at Cokesbury and from all reports none are negative. He is a strong inspirational leader and comments from the congregation are very favorable of his leadership.

Our goal of increasing Sunday School and Vacation Bible School attendance and the teaching ministries of the church were strengthened through Bible studies that had strong participation. We met our goal to have at least fifty adults and twelve children and youth participate in Sunday School, Bible studies and Vacation Bible School. Disciple Bible Study continues to be a strong component of our church's teaching ministries. Two classes were offered this year.

Some of our goals were met from last year and some have to be met in the upcoming years. Our worship attendance increased slightly to 143. We were not able to replace the carpet in the sanctuary or repave the parking lot. We did some painting inside and outside the building and the outbuildings were painted. We have implemented a disaster response plan for Cokesbury members. We participated in the "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors" Igniting Ministries programs by advertising in the Prince William section of the Washington Post. We have not at this time been able to make the upper portion of our church handicapped accessible. However, we have been planning for this and hope to make some progress in the near future. We have not been able to increase our advertising and have had to remove our ad from the Potomac News.

On the positive side, we have fed the homeless at the shelter when we were called on two times. We have sent money to help with the Tsunami relief and Hurricane Katrina. Both of these were sizable sums. We have collected items for Featherstone School. Cokesbury is on track to pay 101% of its benevolences.

Two informational meetings of the congregation were held to determine what direction we were to go in capital improvements. It was decided that we should do the work in house as monies became available. The work will be done wherever possible by members of our congregation. Money was donated to replace two furnaces. A contract was let and these are now in place. The men are in the process of renovating the kitchen and hope to have it completed by the end of the year.

All our mission and outreach goals were accomplished. This included two mission trips by the youth, a contribution to All God's Children Camp by the Helping Hands Group and through Kids' Fest, a community program where children have fun and learn to help others.

Cokesbury is a church on the move where its members feel as family and are working together to serve our Lord. We are determined to work on our goals to make Cokesbury the best it can be.
