## An Easter Message: Resurrection for Today

When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him..."

Mark 16:1-7

One of the blessings of the Resurrection is what it implies for us today. Death has been conquered; it has been transformed from prison to corridor. Those who believe in Christ are not separated from God, but are promised eternal life in the presence of God. The stone has been rolled away from our tomb as well as from Christ's. We live as heirs of the Resurrection; Christ is risen, and we will also live again! Hallelujah!


The women approached the tomb, not knowing how the impossible would be accomplished. They were not expecting a Resurrection; they just wanted to anoint Jesus' body. If they were to honor Jesus' body in death, they wondered, who would roll away the heavy stone that covered the grave?

Could it be that we approach Easter in similar ways? We pour into churches, year after year, celebrating Jesus' resurrection, but perhaps not quite understanding the nature of the Resurrection. We believe that after we die we will live again. Christ is raised, and we will be raised. But the Bible also teaches that Christ is raised and we are raised — right now! Resurrection is also now!

The early church understood this. In Paul's work with the early church, he repeatedly spoke of the implications of the Resurrection for Christians. Paul reminded the Ephesians that they were raised up with Christ and seated in heavenly places (Ephesians 2:6). To the people in Colossae, he said: "When you are buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead" (Col. 2:12). Further reminding them of the implications of their resurrection, he began with the words, "So if you have been raised with Christ . . . "(Col. 3:1). To the Galatians, Paul said, "I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me" (Gal. 2:19-20). The early church was regularly reminded of the present-day implications of the Resurrection for Christians.

People in Christ are given an opportunity to experience Resurrection — the old life is behind us, a new life in heaven lies before us. Jesus has rolled away the stone for us. People of God, emerge from the tomb and live.



#### **MISSION MINUTE:**

"For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, says God. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." Isaiah 55:8

Being a missionary surgeon is difficult. You're not practicing your profession for yourself, but you reflect somebody else. If I have a private practice, my motivation is to do a really good job so patients will refer more patients and I will earn more money and maybe become rich and famous. Being a missionary doctor means if I do something wrong, that reflects on my God. If I do something good, that, too, reflects on my God. So that is much harder!

I'm from Marikina City in the Philippines. I grew up in The United Methodist Church, so my second family is my church. As a missionary, I am assigned to Tansen United Mission Hospital in Nepal. It's almost 200 miles from Kathmandu. My job description is senior surgeon. I also am in charge of the burn unit, and I am the foreign medical students' coordinator.

Jesus didn't just preach God's reign. He ministered to the sick, healing both the body and the spirit. I'd like to follow Jesus' example. Before surgery, I ask patients if I can pray with them. I ask God to guide my hands and my intra-operative decisions, that I do no harm. And I pray for God to give my patient peace. My patients express that they feel confident and secure knowing their surgeon does not rely on her knowledge and strength, but on God.

We don't have a CT scan here. One day I had to operate on a brain. I never had done brain surgery without CT scan. As I scrubbed, I prayed, "I hope my covenant churches are praying for me right now because, otherwise, I know this won't be successful." And by Sunday, the patient was up, walking!

One joy of being a missionary is being connected with so many people. People send cards and emails to tell me, "We're praying for you," and that is so awesome! I like working with people from other Christian faiths, bound by God's love. I am grateful for United Methodists who assist me through the **Advance for Christ and His Church.** Thank you!
