Action in Community Through Service

Recently we received a letter from the Director of the ACTS Helpline. She wanted us to share with our congregation the programs and services that ACTS Helpline can offer. In hopes that you will never need their services, but in the event you do, these are some of the services available to you.

Helpline is a 24-hour service offering confidential listening, information and referrals, crisis intervention for suicide, rape, substance abuse, physical abuse, sexual abuse, and surviving after suicide of a loved one. There is also a crisis line, Ayuda Con Ternura, for Spanish-speaking callers.

A Senior Link program is also available, which is a daily phone connection with a live, caring person for someone who is housebound or has disabilities. Even dedicated church members may appreciate this service. For example, "Gloria" belongs to an active and caring congregation, yet feels the anonymity and confidentiality offered by a Helpline call invaluable in helping her share her problems.

To get in touch with the Helpline Crisis Hotline, you can call 703-368-4141. You will find a caring ear and heart, and they will refer you to other services if necessary.

The Gift Continues

Christmas day is past. In most places, you will no longer see anything that reminds you of the extravagance of gift-giving that was such a part of our society just a short time ago. There are some stores that are still relatively busy with customers returning gifts or trying to use up a gift card, but for most, the excitement of giving and receiving gifts has faded away.

If we relied upon the world to inform us of eternal truths, our secular experience of Christmas would tell us that nothing lasts for very long, and certainly nothing lasts forever. But, thank God, we have a different measuring stick.

The Christian message of Christmas is that God has given an eternal gift to the world. In Jesus Christ, God has given to the world — a gift for every person, a gift of infinite value, and a gift that lasts for all of eternity.

The Apostle Paul describes it this way:

Since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a sacrifice of atonement by his blood, effective through faith. (*Romans 3:23-24*)

Because of God's love for humankind, God sent the gift of a Savior to redeem the world. Through Jesus, sins are forgiven, and the way was established for a life-long (as in eternal life) relationship with God.

In my Christmas Eve sermon message, I spoke about God giving us a "gift within a gift." One way to understand this idea of a "gift within a gift" is that even though Jesus came as a gift of salvation for all humankind, he is, at the same time, your Savior. A plan of salvation is global, but the gift of a Savior is personal. Salvation redeems the whole world; a Savior touches you personally. A Savior takes God's gift of new life and molds it and shapes it just for you.

Another way in which God's gift of a Savior is a "gift within a gift" is that the gift continues. Having been given the gift of new life, Jesus takes and tailors the gift specifically for us. We are given certain talents, abilities, and strengths in order to live fully the life that we have been given. The Apostle Paul tells us:

"But each has a particular gift from God, one having one kind and another a different kind." (1 Corinthians 7:7)

Now I realize that life has many hardships, and for some life can even be a life-long struggle, but that does not mean that God's gift has been withheld. Instead, our Christmas message is "Emmanuel – God with us." God enters into a relationship with us, to lead us through this present life into a fuller and richer eternal life.

As Paul says, "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!" (2 Corinthians 9:15)
