Easter Shalom

One of the most moving scenes in the Gospel of John is Jesus' resurrection appearance to the disciples on the evening of the first Easter. The community of believers is still together, though barely — hanging on by a thread. Fear has seized them, paralyzed them. There is no air in the room. Reading the text, one gets the sense that the disciples are suffocating from fear and the anticipation that they too may face persecution and death. No one is speaking; the Word has died.

Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you" After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit...." (John 20:19–22)

The disciples take a deep breath, inhaling the gift of the Spirit, and they immediately remember — from deep within their collective consciousness — the creative breath that Adam inhaled "in the beginning." (Genesis 2:7) Like the shalom that was born from the dark, watery chaos of their beginnings as a people, it is the risen Christ this time who shares the breath of God's shalom with the community of disciples. It is the first day of the week — a new beginning. Life is born out of chaos and death. The wisdom of the ancestors has again proven to be true:

[There is] a time to weep and a time to laugh;... a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace. (Ecclesiastes 3:4–8)

Jesus' breath, his life-giving Spirit, inaugurates a new time, a new creation — a time to plant and laugh and dance and love, a time for the suffocating silence to break into joyful proclamation and praise. It is a renewal of their hope in God's reign of peace. Shalom becomes a reality when a community comes back to life in the Spirit, when we exhale our fear and inhale the life-giving breath of God. Shalom is real, sings the psalmist, when God's breath recreates us, renewing the face of the earth. (Psalm 104:30)

Jesus breathes out the Holy Spirit, and along with it, his gift of peace. The community of disciples awakens from its deadly paralysis and rediscovers the shalom of God — the spiritual and communal harmony that is the gift of the risen Christ. The story does not end there, though. Along with the life-giving breath of the Spirit, Jesus sends the humbled disciples out to radiate that very same creative peace to the world, to announce the reign of God. "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Shalom is both gift and mission. Freed from the slavery of fear, the disciples are sent out to leave the footprints of God's peace everywhere they go.

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In this Easter season, I pray that each of us may feel the breath of God bringing peace into our lives, and emboldening us to serve Christ. May our service in Christ's name, bring the reign and peace of God more fully into our families, our church, our community, and our world. Amen.

The Cokesbury UMC Flea Market A Short History and a Small Request

On the April 16^{th} we will celebrate our 17^{th} year of running the Cokesbury UMC Flea Market! This year it will run through November 3^{rd} .

In the late 1980's, the committees of Cokesbury United Methodist Church were looking for ways to compensate for needed contributions to complete their annual apportionments. After thoughtful consideration and prayer, Glenn Wirick suggested that Cokesbury start a weekly flea market. We had a beautiful parking lot and it was not normally used on Saturdays, especially in the morning.

After the Administrative Council approved it, Glenn was assigned the task of getting it up and running. After approval by Prince William County and the Prince William County Police, the first flea market was started in the middle of March, 1990. During the first flea market, Dennis Wissinger and Glenn sold coffee and donuts under the trees near the parking lot while it was snowing. There were approximately ten vendors at that first flea market.

Over the years it has grown to between 50 and 60 vendors per week and all the committees of Cokesbury have the chance to participate in running the food stand and the Flea Market Committee collects the vendors fees each weekend.

The flea market has brought in many different vendors. A few have become members of Cokesbury and many have made contributions to Cokesbury above and beyond the fee that they pay each week. Each Saturday, from April through the first Saturday in November the members of Cokesbury, the community, and the vendors get together for a time of fellowship and sharing ideas and wares. The money from the flea market has helped the general fund and the finances of each of the committees that participate.

Cokesbury's committees are faithful in their help with the food concessions during the flea market season. Many members serve on more than one committee, thus an overlap and sometimes, burn-out, occurs.

The History of Red Bird Mission

Red Bird Mission was founded in 1921 in the southeastern corner of Kentucky to provide education and Christian evangelism ministries to residents of the area. Red Bird Mission was born in answer to the prayers of God-fearing people in the mountains of Southeastern Kentucky who prayed that someone would come and help them. The mission of Red Bird today is the same as 1921 - to bring Jesus Christ into every heart and to bring life abundant to all.

Ministries at Red Bird Mission include: the Red Bird Clinic, The Red Bird Mission School for grades K-12, Community Outreach through Clothing and Craft Ministries, The DeWall Senior Citizens Center and the Red Bird Elderly Housing Apartments. These missions receive help from the Work Camp Program where over 2,500 persons volunteer annually to support these missions.
